Hello folks,

Every year, we're treated to a new wave of Christmas adverts—mini films that tug at our hearts, make us laugh, or tempt us to spend. What really makes something a 'Christmas advert'? Does it need to mention Christmas at all, or is it enough to show twinkling lights, snowflakes, and someone discovering the true meaning of the season? By that measure, almost anything can qualify.

No-one does Christmas like M & S - of course there are other supermarket chains challenging for that recognition as brands compete to capture the elusive Christmas Spirit. There's always a lonely old man, a lost toy, or a moment of redemption set to a slowed-down pop song. The storylines may differ, but the message is the same: love, kindness, generosity—and of course, buy something. These adverts are popular. They're warm, inoffensive, and reassuring. They remind us to value family, to forgive, and to believe in something bigger than ourselves. Yet as moving as these messages can be, they're often stripped of the very person whose birth defines Christmas. The Christmas Spirit of modern advertising can make us cry—but it won't change our lives. What the world needs isn't another sentimental slogan. It needs Christ.

The real Christmas story isn't glossy or convenient. It's about God choosing humility over grandeur, entering the world not as a powerful ruler, but as a vulnerable child. It's about love that takes on our fragility and brokenness, so that we might be made whole.



Jesus didn't come to sell a feeling. He came to show us a way of living: love your enemies, forgive those who hurt you, care for your neighbour, and give of yourself freely. That's not a marketing message—it's a calling.

There's a story about a wee boy who made a ceramic gift for his mum. Running to show it to her, he tripped, and it shattered. His father tried to comfort him—"Don't cry, it doesn't matter." But his mother knelt down, gathered the pieces, and said softly, "Oh, it does matter." And she wept with her son. That's the heart of Christmas: not pretending things aren't broken, but finding love in the midst of our breaking. We stumble, fail, and fall short—but the wonder of Emmanuel, 'God with us,' is that we fall into forgiving arms. Christmas invites us to stop pretending perfection and to live in hope: the hope of grace, of second chances, of restoration.

Now is the time to move in a new and better direction. However far we've wandered, there is always hope with God. Our confidence doesn't come from our fleeting faith or our festive feelings, but from God's steadfast love for us.

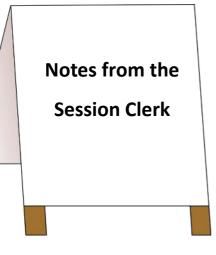
So this year, when the adverts roll and the jingle bells play, don't settle for sentimentality. Let's make Christmas real—not with spending, but with living. Let our lives say, "I will live love. I will share love. I will do what is right."

When people notice something different in us and ask what we have that they don't, the answer isn't a product or a feeling. The answer is Christ—our hope, our peace, our joy, and our love.

### Random Acts of Kindness for the environment

During November, my workplace was recognising World Kindness Day, which was held on 14<sup>th</sup> November. We had different types of activities, that recognised kindness in the team or setting where we worked, from saying thank you to our colleagues or playing "kindness bingo". One of the other activities was to encourage individuals to complete a random act of kindness. Acts of kindness is something we do exceptionally well in NLK, and I am seeing the same acts of kindness and sharing across our eco work.

Over the past few weeks, I have had the pleasure of random acts of thoughtful kindness, with members sharing ideas in

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relation to the work of the eco group. I have been given a brilliant book (see right) to read on environmentally friendly cleaning materials, and inside were pages from a magazine with green climate friendly hints and tips.



Some of these have made their way into our eco congregational flyer that is included as a 4 page

section for you to pull out and keep in the middle of this magazine. The idea of the flyer came from a member who wasn't on social media and didn't know how they, as an individual, could contribute to the eco plan within NLK. I hope that everyone reading it, will find some of the ideas useful and feel able to participate and support our eco work as a result.

I have been stopped in the church on a Sunday to give me batteries, or for someone to tell me what they are doing in their garden. People are also starting to ask about widening our recycling in the church and sharing ideas of what we can take in – there will be more of this in the next magazine once I finalise the recycling calendar!

I love these random acts of eco-kindness; it's brilliant to hear of the ideas that are coming forward and for everyone's enthusiasm and participation.



Our journey towards our gold award has begun in earnest and there are lots of activities planned for the coming months. We have introduced domestic battery recycling, so please bring any undamaged but dead batteries to the sanctuary and place in the non-flammable box

beside the tea tables. Please do not add damaged or

leaking batteries – these must be disposed of differently and cannot be recycled or placed in domestic waste.

We have had another successful community litter pick, when, despite the drizzly weather, members of



the congregation and our BB Company still ventured out and helped to tidy up our town centre. One of the volunteers even managed a spot of outreach work with a family asking what she was doing and why; turns out this was one of our Little Seed families, so we hope to see them around NLK in future.



A funding bid has been submitted to support increasing bio-diversity; both in and around the church and town centre. Hopefully we will be awarded some additional money for the church yard and local community gardens.

The Fellowship of Churches Harvest service was themed around land and sea to celebrate creation.

The flyer shares some ideas for you to do at home and in and around the church buildings, to help reduce the impact of climate change. I hope that you find it helpful, with ideas which can be carried out all year round.

For some more festive specific tips, have a look for plastic free crackers, for example. This reduces what goes to landfill, with all spent crackers being added to paper recycling. Gift wrap and tags can be purchased using recycled paper for presents.

Another big consideration is reducing food waste. Buy what you need and use your leftovers (a fave in my family is Boxing Day pie using up all the leftovers!). Cut down on plastics if you can.

We are also hoping to have some Fair-Trade Christmas decorations available this year – please keep an eye on our social media for details. In a world where we can be anything, be kind. Kind to ourselves, our neighbours, work colleagues, friends, but also to our world. God made it very special; let's do our bit to keep it that way.

The next 'Church Unplugged' services will be: November 23rd, December 14th, February 1st, 6:30pm-7:30pm in our church. All are welcome!



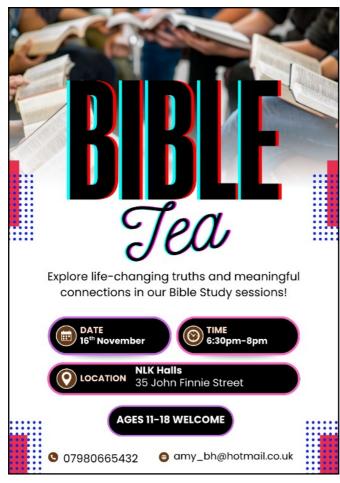

## At Home – Everyday Actions for a Greener Life



### Energy & Waste

Switch to LED lighting and unplug devices when not in use.

Reduce heating use by layering clothing and using draft excluders.

Recycle properly and compost food waste.

Avoid single-use plastics—opt for reusable containers and bags.

Wash laundry in full loads and dry outdoors to reduce use of tumble driers.

### Shopping & Consumption

Buy local and seasonal produce to reduce carbon footprint.

Reduce food waste by buying what you need.

Use leftovers or donate to foodbanks.

Choose Fairtrade and ethically sourced goods.

Repair, reuse, and repurpose before replacing items.



### Travel & Mobility

Walk, cycle, or use public transport whenever possible.

Car share for church events or community activities.

Attend virtual meetings if available.

Fly less—consider local holidays.



## Nature & Biodiversity

Plant pollinator-friendly flowers in gardens or window boxes.

Use peat free compost (Western Road site provides compost free of charge!).

Support local conservation efforts and wildlife charities.

Reduce lawn mowing frequency to encourage biodiversity.

## Recycle

Increase recycling with domestic arrangements for plastic/cans/glass/paper/food.

Recycle electronics, cables, phones, chargers via approved outlets e.g. Western Road facilities.

Watch out for our NLK recycling calendar for 2026.

## Eco-friendly Home Cleaning Tips

Reduce use of plastics in general e.g. bars of soap rather than bottles of liquid soap.

Use eco-friendly cleaning products or make your own e.g. sodium carbonate and vinegar to deep clean washing machine; eco-friendly washing up liquid and vinegar for windows.

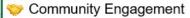

On Saturday 30<sup>th</sup> August the Guild Coffee Morning took place from 10am till noon. There was a good turnout and, as ever, all those who attended were very generous, helping us to raise £1050 which will contribute towards

the Guild projects. Many people commented on the lovely atmosphere in the hall, which was good to hear. I think folks were glad to be getting back into the swing of things after the summer break.

The first actual meeting of our new session was on Monday, 15<sup>th</sup> September and our minister David spoke on the topic of 'Living Stones', our theme for this year, before leading us in the service of Holy Communion. Although Communion is always a special occasion, I find our Guild service very moving and uplifting, especially the 'peace'. Members shook hands with those around them but David, Elspeth and I went round everyone. It was lovely! Before we had our cuppa, we took a photo of us all together behind the Guild tables (see below).



You might have seen it on the church Facebook page. I sent it off to the National Guild office as we had been asked to let them know what we were doing to celebrate Guild Week. It then appeared on the Guild

Facebook page and in the autumn newsletter online. They must have recognised David as they mentioned that he is chairman of the board of trustees! Anyway, they commented that it was a very fitting way to celebrate Guild Week – and it was!

On 29<sup>th</sup> September we had a speaker from Helping Hands, which is a local charity. For a small annual fee anyone who is elderly or vulnerable can register with them. You can then call upon them for help in the home with many tasks such as changing a light bulb, turning a mattress, putting up curtains, cleaning the insides of windows. We were given so many leaflets that I put some in church and I know that many people in the congregation had already made use of their services.

attending 'Magnitude', a
Scripture Union camp
which took place at
Lendrickmuir near Perth in
the summer time.
Matthew, Logan and Amelia
Wallace from our own
church were there with
Amelia's friend Cara and
her dad Ross from St

Kentigern's. Angela Wallace came along too, with Cara's mum, Anne. Logan started off by telling us about the day to day activities and the speakers. Matthew spoke about the worship, especially the music, and played piano for Amelia as lead singer with Cara on the beatbox and Ross on guitar as they shared some of their favourite songs. They answered the many questions from guild members – it was wonderful to see how natural and yet how confident they were. The mums did fill in details about travel, eating, camping and washing! The young folk

gave us great hope for the future as they spoke so enthusiastically about their experiences and the fact that they were part of a group of 2000 youngsters brought together by their interest in the Christian faith. They chatted to members as we had tea and showed us lots of photos. They even helped to tidy up!

On 27<sup>th</sup> October we had a speaker from the charity Sense Scotland, which originally helped deaf/blind people, although they now help those with even more complex needs. The main focus of the talk was Mecoco Candles, the products being made by people with complex disabilities in a workshop in Dalry. They all have helpers and do what they can to help and this gives them a sense of purpose and self respect. And a lot of enjoyment! The products are all well-produced and ethically sourced. There were lots of candles, wax melts and burners for sale and they did a roaring trade. The guild ladies had brought their purses!

On 29<sup>th</sup> October, two of our members went to the first meeting of the new Ayrshire Guilds Together, which was held in St Nicholas' Church in Prestwick. There was a good turnout and the speaker was Alison Burnett from Arran, who had visited Malawi with other national guild members. We saw pictures of Rev Gloria who visited us last year and heard about the fruit trees and fields provided by money from the Guild Big Sings. They were involved in celebrations of 150 years of the presbytery of Livingstonia, with much singing and dancing. Alison is our next speaker so all the ladies will get to hear about the trip first hand.

After that we look forward to Dalrymple Ukelele Band, which will be an open meeting with the offering going to the next Malawi project – the fitting out of a maternity unit in the area we support, so that women do not need to walk miles when in labour and have decent facilities close by.

Then on 8<sup>th</sup> December we are going to the Fenwick Hotel for Christmas Dinner. Looking forward to it! Happy Christmas from the Guild!

I find it hard to imagine Donald Trump as an answer to prayer! However, as I write this, the hostages taken by Hamas who remain alive, and some of the bodies of those who died have been returned to Israel and hundreds of Palestinians who were imprisoned in Israel have been sent back to Gaza. We have prayed for peace — and this is by no means 'peace', but it is

a start, a hopeful sign and it would seem to have been brought about by the intervention of the President of the United States of America, Donald Trump. When we listen to the words that spout from his mouth, it seems incredible that he has achieved that position, not once but twice, and incredible that he should become a peacemaker, despite his great self-belief. It brings to mind the saying, "Fools rush in where angels fear to tread" and if his actions bring about positive steps towards peace, then surely we should thank God for it!

too. It was when these characters encountered God in person that their lives were turned around. Certainly, hearing God's voice from a burning bush or having a vision of Jesus on the road to Damascus would make most of us take notice! However, we know that much less dramatic encounters with God can change the least of us and make us fit to play our small part in the divine plan.

We continue to meet in prayer online on the first Wednesday of the month at a time of our minister David's choosing, to fit in with his other commitments, usually 6.30pm. Inspire also meets at 11am on the second Wednesday of the month in the session room for a time of quiet prayer and reflection. All are welcome to take part in either or both of these. Just ask if you need more information.

Meanwhile, here are some suggestions for your own prayer times:

- Pray for the continuing situation in Israel and Gaza, that moves towards a lasting peace may strengthen and move forward.
- Pray for all the war zones that we forget when they drop out of our news headlines – Ukraine, Yemen, Sudan etc., etc.
- Pray for the people of Jamaica who were hit by the catastrophic hurricane.
- Pray for the regeneration of our town, both physically and spiritually.
- Pray for our youth worker, Amy, as she drives forward her new initiative with children, young people and families – Little Seeds, Church Unplugged and Bible Teas. And pray for all those who get involved.
- Pray that all the church activities in the lead up to Christmas will awaken afresh in us the wonder and excitement of the coming of Christ into our world And as we pray for others, may God make us answers to someone's heartfelt prayer! Happy Christmas!

### East Ayrshire Churches Homelessness Action Scottish Charity SC52257

East Ayrshire Churches Homelessness Action held its Annual General Meeting in October. This is the one day in the year when all strands of the charity report on progress over the past year, and it's the opportunity to reflect on how far we have come over the years.



The new hub

Steph McCutcheon, our Network and Service manager, spoke of the move from the John Finnie Street hub, to the new hub across the road in John Dickie Street. John Finnie Street served us well, and was the foundation for the new building. John Dickie Street has been designed in part by those who will use the space, a place designed for belonging as well as for function.

He reported on remarkable figures of growth over the past three years. For example, between 2023 to 2025 the number of individuals supported by EACH Recovery rose from 297 to 598, and is projected to exceed 1000 by March 2026, more than trebling in two years.

Early in 2026, the Community Friends drop-in will move over to the new hub, bringing all our work together under one roof. Steph reminded us all that we are more than a charity, we are a community movement built on 20 years of faith, persistence and care.

Our Community Friends drop-in continues to grow in numbers. Regularly we run out of seats within twenty minutes of opening. On a recent Wednesday we had 76 in for lunch, with increasing numbers enjoying cooked breakfast on Mondays and Fridays. Some of the rise may be due to our chef Michael's innovative menu, but even more, Community Friends is about a warm welcome, a safe space and listening ears.

One of our regulars said that the only difference between the drop-in and a restaurant is that in the restaurant there's a bill! We do it with love and a smile.

The facilities in the new hub will allow us to open the drop-in on five days a week, rather than three. There will also be a Wednesday evening Recovery Café.

We could always use new volunteers! There's a job for everyone. If you are interested please give Michael or Janice a ring.

Our Chair, Rev David Cameron, quoted Isaiah chapter 58:

'Is this not the kind of fasting I have chosen — to loose the chains of injustice, to share your food with the hungry, to provide the poor wanderer with shelter?'

The prophet Isaiah is saying that religion without compassion is hollow. True worship begins in the streets, the cafes, the hubs, the hostels, where love takes shape in action. 'Each Person Matters', not a project or a problem, but a neighbour or a friend.

Isaiah says that when we live this way, 'Our light will break forth like the dawn.'

That's what's happening in our town. The light is breaking through in unmistakable ways.

Isaiah ends with a promise:

'You will be called Repairer of Broken Walls, Restorer of Streets with Dwellings.'

What a name for a people, what a calling for a community.

Our Christmas lunch for those who attend Community Friends will be held on Wednesday 17<sup>th</sup> December, in the downstairs hall. Michael is pulling out all the stops to make this a special day for the men and women we support, probably the only Christmas dinner for many this year. We will also provide hot food on 26<sup>th</sup> December and 2<sup>nd</sup> January, for those who might find the Christmas season a very lonely time.

The Christmas gift service will take place in our church on Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> December. As ever, your gifts are very much appreciated. Please remember that we provide gifts for all ages, from birth to age 18, and gifts for the very young and for older teenagers will be especially welcome.

# Michael's Easy Peasy Mini Mince Pies

#### Michael Smith:

I first stumbled across the EACHa organisation when I attended the Each Recovery Matters hub for support and guidance. After being pointed in the right direction,

I was able to start my own recovery journey. Things came full circle when I began volunteering at the Community Friends drop-in, which led to my current position as Project Coordinator. I'm grateful every day for this role, as it allows me to give back and provide support for others by dishing out some of the best scran in Ayrshire!

As the festive season approaches I thought this year I would step out my comfort zone and share one of the very first things I learned to make at catering college almost 30 years ago.

#### Michael's Easy Peasy Mini Mince Pies

I absolutely love mince pies, but I'm really not a fan of the shop bought ones, they are too big and too sweet for my taste and just all the wrong texture. These Easy Peasy Mini Mince Pies are much smaller and made with a simple, savoury pastry, which I think perfectly compliments the sweetness of the mincemeat.

#### Mincemeat cheat

You can of course make your own mincemeat, but for speed and simplicity I have used shop bought mincemeat in these mince pies. My favourite brand is Marks and Spencer's Classic Mincemeat. I just love it and use it every year, so much so that I'm not sure I can I can bring myself to make my own mincemeat — as it just wouldn't taste the same (unless of course Marks and Spencer's want to give me their recipe...??)

#### The perfect pastry for mince pies...

As I mentioned above, I make these mince pies with a very simple, classic savoury pastry which only has three ingredients: flour, butter and water. I love the rich buttery, flaky, melt in the mouth texture that you get – so much better than the stodgy over-sweet pastry you get on shop bought ones. I think the mincemeat has enough sweetness not to need extra sugar in the pastry, but if you have a sweeter tooth than me, try adding 100g of sugar to the pastry mixture just after you have rubbed the butter and sugar together

#### ....made the old fashioned way

I always rub the butter into the flour by hand. It's really very easy and I actually enjoy doing it – it makes it feel proper somehow and of course my kids absolutely adore this part and do it with great glee and gusto (while I shout "keep the flour in the bowl!!"). Seriously, if my kids can rub together butter and flour, anyone can do it! But you can of course make the pastry in a food processor, if you prefer. Just pop the flour and the cubed butter in your processor and pulse until it resembles breadcrumbs, then add the water drop by drop and pulse until it starts to come together, then take the pastry out of the processor and roll it into a ball by hand. Either way, It is essential for this recipe that the pastry is that it's rolled out thinly – so thin you can almost see through it! Easy Peasy Mini Mince Pies



Nothing beats homemade mince pies! These star topped mini mince pies are super easy to make and utterly delicious. Ideal for making with kids (but grownups love them too!) They also freeze beautifully, meaning you can have homemade mince pies whenever you want.

#### Recipe

Prep Time: 20 minutes

Cook Time: 15 minutes

Total Time: 35 minutes

Servings 24 mince pies

#### Equipment

- 2 cupcake trays (each with 12 holes)
- Baking paper (or the butter wrapper will do)
- Mixing bowl
- Wooden spoon
- Rolling pin
- Circle shaped cutter, 8cm / 3inch diameter (mine is fluted, but you can use a normal one if you prefer)
- Star shaped cutter, 7cm / 2½inch from point to point
- Pastry brush
- Wire cooling rack (or improvise with your grill rack or a roasting rack)
- Sieve
- Cake tin for storing your mince pies when they've cooled down (if there are any left!)

#### Ingredients (Metric)

- 350 g plain flour (US all purpose flour) plus extra for dusting
- 175 g cold butter cut into 1cm / ½inch cubes (plus extra for greasing)
- A little cold water (roughly 6-8 tablespoons)
- 250 g mincemeat (I use Marks and Spencer Classic Mincemeat)
- A little milk
- 3 tablespoons icing sugar

#### Instructions

- 1. Grease the holes of 2 cupcake trays (24 holes in total), using a little butter on some baking paper. Preheat your oven to 220C / 200C fan.
- 2. Place the flour in the bowl (you can sieve it if you like, but I never bother) and add the cubes of cold butter. Rub the butter and flour between your fingers (as if you are trying to rub the flour into the butter) until it resembles breadcrumbs. (See Note 1.)
- 3. Stir in a tablespoon of cold water and stir into the butter/flour mixture thoroughly. Add another tablespoon of cold water and stir in thoroughly. Repeat this process until the mixture just starts to come together. I usually find this happens after about 6-8 tablespoons but it does vary. Don't add too much water!
- 4. As soon as your pastry starts coming together, stop adding water and use your hands to squish the pastry together into a ball.
- 5. Sprinkle your work surface with a little flour and pop your ball of pastry on top. Roll your pastry out as thin as it will go. (It might be easier, depending on the size if your work surface, to split the pastry into 2 balls and do them 1 at a time.)

- 6. Using a circle shaped cutter, cut out 24 circles and place them into the greased holes of you cupcake trays.
- 7. Put 1 teaspoonful of mincemeat in the centre of each circle.
- 8. Squish together the pastry, roll it into a ball and roll out thinly again. This time cut out 24 stars, using your star shaped cutter, Place each star on top of the mincemeat, roughly in the centre (this is a bit hit and miss with children!) and press down slightly so the star sticks.
- 9. Using a pastry brush, brush over a little milk. (Not strictly necessary, but it makes the mince pies go a more golden colour.)
- 10. Put the mince pies in your preheated oven for 15-20 minutes, until the mincemeat is bubbling and the pastry is golden on top.
- 11. Take your mince pies out of the cupcake tin and place them on a wire rack to cool I find it easiest to lever the mince pies out with a dessert spoon take care not to burn yourself as they will be superhot!
- 12. While the mince pies are still warm, put a couple of tablespoons of icing sugar into a sieve and dust the icing sugar over the mince pies. (You can use an icing sugar dredger if you prefer.)
- 13. The mince pies can be eaten warm or cold, on their own or with cream or custard.
- 14. When the mince pies are completely cool they can be stored in a cake tin, or other air tight container... that is if there are any left!
