

Psalm 37:3-5



Christian Aid News

All over the world, the need is increasing. In the past year we have

seen horrific scenes of devastation in the earthquake in Syria and Turkey, the floods in Pakistan, famine in sub-Saharan Africa in places where scarcely any rain has fallen for four years, not to mention people displaced by conflict and terrorists in Yemen, Sudan, Myanmar, Afghanistan and Ukraine.

In the face of such tragedies and unimaginable suffering, we may feel helpless. How can our tiny contributions make the slightest difference to people's woes? Think again as we are remember the Starfish story.

A man was walking on a beach when he saw a boy picking up something from the sand and throwing it into the sea, over and over again. He asked the boy what he was doing. "Throwing stranded starfish back into the sea before they die", said the boy.



The man replied, "You are fighting a losing battle, as there are hundreds of them here. Throwing back a few won't make much difference." "Well, "replied the lad as he threw back another starfish, "it made a huge difference to that one!".

The moral of the tale is that if no one gives anything to those in need, nothing will happen, but if many people give a little, it does make a difference in people's lives.

Donations to Christian Aid from our church increased this year, thanks to collections in Christian Aid Week plus a concert in April. None of this would have happened but for the sterling efforts of Kilmarnock's Christian Aid Secretary, Helen Colman, and those who responded to her appeal for help.

It is amazing to think that Kilmarnock's Christian Aid Committee consists of Helen, a Treasurer and one other person. An appeal is therefore being made to all local churches for more people to join this Committee and bring in fresh ideas for new types of fundraising idea. The Committee is especially keen to hear from young people who will have novel ideas about what kinds of events will appeal to their age group and new ways of communicating with their generation.

Prayer Group

Pastoral Care Group News

The aim of our Pastoral Care Group is to ensure that no one in our church family feels forgotten because they may not be able to come to church services. We offer support and friendship mainly to older members of our congregation, but also to anyone who is experiencing a difficult time in their life. If you would value any of the following services, please let us know.

- We visit people who are housebound at home or in care homes, or keep in touch via friendly phone calls.
- Twice a year we host Silver Sunday afternoon services led by our Minister in the church. We also invite our guests to enjoy afternoon tea in our halls in the spring and before Christmas, with entertainment and time to chat to friends. Of course, all these events include home baking, tea and coffee! Door to door transport is provided where required.
- We send seasonal gifts to housebound people.
- We lead worship in Argyll Care Home once a month.
- Some people simply enjoy reading our monthly newsletter and we'll be pleased to add you to our mailing list.

These activities cannot happen without a team of willing volunteers, who find immense satisfaction in befriending the people whom we serve. In recent years the number of helpers has reduced due to volunteers' circumstances. Without giving away

any secrets, I shall simply say that many of us have had a bus pass for quite a few years!

We are actively recruiting volunteers, especially as New Laigh Kirk's parish has greatly expanded following the union with St John's Church. The good news is that volunteers can choose the aspects of pastoral care work in which to be involved. Please consider whether you can help, either occasionally or regularly, in any of the following ways:

- Visiting or phoning people who are mainly housebound at home or in care homes.
- Delivering monthly newsletters.
- Delivering gifts at Easter and Christmas.
- Driving people four times a year to our Silver Sunday services and afternoon teas.
- Entertaining at our afternoon teas.
- Singing at our care home services.





We are Fair Trade Kirk We are an Eco-Congregation

When the union that created New Laigh Kirk came into being we inherited from Grange Church eco-congregation status. Eco-Congregation is an ecumenical programme helping churches make the link between environmental issues and

Christian faith, to respond in practical action in the church, in the lives of individuals, and in the local and global community.

However much has changed in the way that eco-congregation operates, so it is suggested we begin the process again, so all of the congregation of NLK is on board with what we are doing and trying to achieve, and where possible linked to our Mission Plan.

This is not about creating a new committee to take us forward but merely a small group to collate all we already do and need to do to truly be an Eco-Congregation.

Our first task is to create a formal plan as outlined by ecocongregation. This is done by using an evaluation template provided for that purpose. This is a whole congregation journey not just our Minister, office bearers and organisations, so you may be asked to assist in answering a questionnaire.

With the echoes of Cop 26 still reverberating around the world, now is the perfect time to put into action Monday to Saturday, the words that are preached from the pulpit on a Sunday. At our recent Family Communion sermon, the words "No individual can live alone, no nation can live alone, and anyone who feels that he can live alone is sleeping through a revolution" were used. Martin Luther King spoke those words. King also stated that, "Before you finish breakfast this morning

you've depended on more than half the world". This fact shows how our habits affect others globally, as the Global South strives to feed the Global North.

We, as a congregation, connect with each other plus others in our community locally and others we do not know or see globally. We do it in a Christian manner that hopefully is eco-friendly.

The two quotations from Martin Luther King can be used as inspiration for the way forward. In the coming weeks and months more will be shared.

East Ayrshire Churches Homelessness Action (EACHa) was formed as a charity in 2005, and now comprises around 22 participating churches. New Laigh Kirk has taken a leading role from the beginning, and we are privileged to have been allowed to use our John Finnie Street hall to host our Community Friends drop-ins.

Our other congregations support the charity by providing food, toiletries, household goods, Christmas gifts, cash and volunteers. We could not manage without our partner churches.

Our aim is and has always been to prevent or reduce homelessness. The Community Friends drop-ins provide a one-stop shop for anyone in need, whether simply in need of a hot meal or a food parcel, or requiring assistance with housing, debt, benefits, mental or physical health, or support on their recovery journey. We also provide haircuts, dental advice and eye checks. Our drop-in is the place where our professional partners know they can find their 'hard to reach' clients. One of our homelessness nurses put it like this:



Haircutting

One of the most remarkable aspects of EACHa Drop-In is the collaboration with other support services. By working alongside EACHa volunteers, nursing, housing agencies, benefits services, community well-being cops, oral health professionals, and peer recovery supports, EACHa has created a network of care that extends far beyond the immediate individual presence of each agency. This multidisciplinary approach allows us as nurses to address the diverse needs of our service users comprehensively, ensuring they have access to the resources and support systems necessary for their well-

being.

We also aim to meet our clients' wellbeing needs. Hot meals are available at our drop-ins — breakfast on Mondays and Fridays and a hot dish such as mince and tatties on Wednesdays. Everyone is offered a food parcel to take away. Service users are involved in planning the meals, quite difficult when some say tuna pasta is their favourite, and others say 'anything but tuna'!

The aim of the Friendly Fresh Start project is to help people settle into their new homes, and avoid repeat homelessness. Many of the items in the FFS packs have been donated by church members, and we are very grateful for these. Cleaning materials are also very welcome, allowing the recipients to take pride in their own new homes.

Donations of essential household goods can be delivered to our premises at 32B Grange Street, which is staffed Mondays and Wednesdays, 9am till 12noon.

From time to time we receive donations from local supermarkets, most recently a donation of new clothes from Tesco Extra.

The Recovery Hub celebrated its 1st Birthday on 1st August. Can it really be just a year since the John Finnie Street Hub opened? They have gone from strength to strength, and have made a real difference to many people. It is bursting at the seams, and weekly sessions include: New Heights walking group; Recovery Rocks music group; AA and CA meetings; Veterans group, Thrive for women.

Anyone is welcome just to walk in, no appointment needed. There is always someone available to help.

International Overdose Awareness Day is on Thursday 31st August. This was a huge success last year, with people marching from the North West Centre to the Howard Park, where there were several inspirational speakers, including the then Minister responsible for drugs policy, Angela Constance. It was a very poignant day, many of those present marking the loss of a loved one to overdose.

This year's walk is from Patchwork, in Wellington Street, to the Howard Park, where there will be many stalls, speakers and attractions. There will once again be a Rose Ceremony, where people will have the opportunity to remember those who have been lost to overdose. Fingers crossed for a repeat of last year's sunshine!


and push the heavens back into place and I will give thanks for you will be with me. You will put the stars back in the sky.
